Public Opinion Strategies is pleased to present the key findings of an online national survey. The survey was completed September 22-27, 2021, among 1,000 likely voters, and has a credibility interval of $\pm 3.53\%$.


Glen Bolger and Jim Hobart were the principal researchers on this project. Torie Bolger was the project director, and Katie Connolly provided analytical support.



Immigration and The Border

Nine in ten voters believe politicians promise action on the border but fail to deliver.

“Please read the following statement, then indicate whether you agree or disagree. Politicians keep promising action on immigration and the border, but never work together to pass legislation to do anything about it. The time for talk has long passed. It is time for solutions on immigration and the border.”



Voters across partisan lines believe Congress should act on border security before the 2022 elections.

“Border crossings are currently at record levels. Should Congress act BEFORE the 2022 elections on the proposal to address border security and reform our immigration, or should they wait until AFTER the 2022 elections?”





More than 70% of voters are in favor of providing a pathway to citizenship for Dreamers.

“Do you favor or oppose providing a pathway to citizenship for undocumented immigrants who came to the United States as children? These people are also known as Dreamers.”^



A majority of GOPers back a pathway to citizenship. Support among Independents tops 70%.


Pathway To Citizenship by Party



There is strong support for strengthening border security across partisan lines.


Strengthening Border Security by Party



Three-quarters of voters back a proposal for ensuring a legal, reliable workforce for America's farmers.



Immigration Proposal Description

“There is a proposal in Congress that would address immigration and border security. This proposal brings together three bills, [all of which have bipartisan support]. This proposal would:**

Provide a pathway to citizenship for undocumented immigrants who came to the United States as children. These people are also known as Dreamers.

Strengthen border security at our southern border with Mexico through enhanced personnel and patrol, improved technology, and more immigration judges to speed up legal processing of individuals crossing the border.


Ensure a legal, reliable workforce for America’s farmers and ranchers by streamlining the agricultural guest worker program and providing earned legal status for essential undocumented agricultural workers.”

More than three-quarters of voters back the merged bill.


“Do you favor or oppose this proposal?”^

“Why do you favor this proposal in Congress that would address immigration, border security, and agricultural worker immigrants?”



“Why do you oppose this proposal in Congress that would address immigration, border security, and agricultural worker immigrants?”




